After a close back and forth first quarter, the Lakers found themselves with a 27-21 lead, with head coach Frank Vogel only focused on one thing: turnovers.

Although the focus for the Lakers had a large emphasis on limiting turnovers after quarter 1, Miami's defense only stiffened as halftime neared, causing problems especially for Lebron James, who finished the half with 5 turnovers and only 8 points on 3/8 shooting.
